Hung. and Polish refugees of a questionable character. - An officer of the U.S., of high personal character writes under the 5th ult, from Constantinople:

"On the 19th of June the regular Engl. steamer left Coblenz, to Southampton with 110 so-called refugees on board, with 30 more from the 'Dardaw', 140 in all. Of the 110, 30 are nominally Polish refugees and 80 are nominally Hung. setrefles. But I am sorry to say that the Poles are represented to me as being the dregs of the emigrants, and many of them were Jewish Poles, tradesmen here established, who imposed upon the generosity of the Turk. Govt to obtain a gratuitous passage. Of the 80 called Hungarians, there are some Italians & Greeks of miserable reputation. Certainly ^{there} are also Hungarians, honorable and brave, among them. But on their arrival at NY several of their leading men, ought to be employed to point out such
