Until last fall, Joe Eszterhas, 27, was a bright and sassy reporter for the Cleveland Plain Dealer. Then he was fired for having written a piece in Evernewer Review that criticized his paper, himself and all others concerned with the merchandising of Ronald Haeberle's exclusive photographs of the My Lai massacre.\* Eszterhas, backed by the American Newspaper Guild, protested the dismissal, and the case went to Arbitrator Calvin L. McCoy for judgment. In ruling against Eszterhas, McCoy

\*The *Plain Dealer* first published the photos. Haeberle, with Eszterhas' help, then sold the photos to LIFE. asked: "Can you bite the hand that feeds you and insist on staying for future banquets?" Eszterhas, now writing for Rolling Stone, maintained that the Plain Dealer "hired me to do a job for 40 hours a week and I did that job. Bùt, outside that job I have rights as a human being, and when something strikes my conscience. I have a right to speak out."
