BELGRADE AWAITS CSAKY

Hungarian Is Expected to Sign a Friendship Pact With Yugoslavia

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Dec. 5

The forthcoming visit of Count Stephen Ssaky, the Hungarian Foreign Minister, continues to occupy the Yugoslav press.

Wide interest was created in diplomatic circles by an interview granted the Hungarian newspaper *Magyarország* by Yugoslavia's Minister of Justice Lazar Markovitch. Referring to the economic ties between the Yugoslavia and Hungary, Mr. Markovitch said:

"All Europe and the whole world will take a new form. Naturally Hungary and Yugoslavia cannot expect a leading role in the formation of this new order, but it is important that they should march together and not by separate ways in the face of the new situation."

Count Csaky is expected to arrive in Belgrade for a three-day visit between Wednesday and Saturday. It is expected that a Yugoslav-Hungarian treaty of friendship, similar to that between Yugoslavia and Bulgaria, will be signed by Count Csaky and Dr. Alexander Cincar-Markovitch, the Yugoslav Foreign Minister, after which Count Csaky is to join Prince Paul, the Yugoslav Regent, on a hunting trip.
