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ASK MORE DETAILS ON FREE HUNGARY

Akron Leaders Want Plans for Future Discussed

AKRON, O., Oct. 4—Contending that neither Tibor Eckhardt, former member of the Hungarian Parliament and new head of the American-Hungarian Federation in the United States, nor Dr. Rosten Vambery, head of the Democratic Hungarians, has outlined plainly his plans for a Hungarian government in exile in the United States, officials of the United Hungarian Organizations of Akron today said they could not indorse the aims of either party until they had cleared up several points raised here.

Denouncing a recent statement by the American-Hungarian Federation that "American citizens would form the Hungarian government in exile" as "premature and childish," the officials, in a statement signed by John Papp, president, Henry Weisfeld, secretary, and Frank Lajtha, treasurer, said that "the free Hungary movement, while finding favor in the hearts of all Hungarians here, has failed so far to arouse any interest toward

joining the group.

"Eckhardt, although given opportunity to express himself freely in the Hungarian press here, has not told us what kind of a free Hungary he desires," the statement went on.

"Is his kind of a Hungary one that will keep the peasant landless? Is it the kind that will keep in force the present labor restrictions? Will it keep in force the anti-semitic laws forced upon that unhappy country? Will it help to keep in power the forces that helped Hungary to become an unwilling food arsenal for Hitler? These and other questions we would like to have answered.

"Dr. Vambery, who met with the Hungarian Democrats in Cleveland two weeks ago, has also announced a plan for the organization of American Hungarians for the purpose of advocating a free Hungary," the statement continued.

"We are loyal American citizens who want to help unfortunates in or from the land of our birth but we feel that this can best be done by supporting a free and democratic Hungary.

"With this in mind, we urge the leaders of both groups to meet on one platform here so that the 15,000 Hungarian people of Akron can hear discussed the problems of how best to bring about a united action for help for Hungary."
