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U. S. Bars 'Free' Movement Here

Asks Undivided
Loyalty of Citizens

The State Department yesterday called for undivided allegiance to the United States by all American citizens, whatever their racial origin, and in doing so, gave a definite cold shoulder to the "Free French" and other "Free" movements.

The statement of policy mentioned no specific movement, but said this Government "disapproves of any attempts to enlist the support of American citizens of like racial background on the theory that they are 'fellow nations.'"

The announcement referred to the various "Free" movements. There was the direct implication that political leaders from other countries—no matter how friendly they may be to American war aims—will receive no support in attempts to enlist American citizens in racial or national group movements.

Among the various "Free" movements active in the country, in addition to France's De Gaulle followers, are those of Americans who have aligned themselves with the Netherlands, Polish, Belgian, Czechoslovakian and Norwegian exiled governments.
