

## Axis-Budapest Pact Opposed By Hungarian Groups in U. S.

A movement to preserve Hungary's independence and to start work for foreign representation of its government in the event Hungary is absorbed by Germany, was launched yesterday by 100 delegates of the American Hungarian Federation meeting in special conference in the National Press Club.

Believing the Nazi-Hungarian independence, leading Hungarian-

American citizens asked the executive committee of the federation to initiate the movement, according to Dr. Tibor Kerekes, secretary of the executive committee, and a member of the faculty at Georgetown University.

Senator Harold Burton (R.), of Ohio, a luncheon guest told delegates their program was "thoroughly consistent with this country's present foreign policy."

George Borshy-Kerekes, who was designated to be the organizer of the Indep. Hungary movement (the foregoing day Council of Reformed Federation permitted him to go over to the A.H. Federation for six months) during this meeting in Washington Hotel made the following remark:

"This movement will be just as much anti-Hitler, as it will be anti-Churchill."
