## Seek Post-War Justice for Hungary

## Organize Here Today to Aid Post-War Hungary

The Federation of Democratic Magyars, representing more than 750,000 Americans of Hungarian origin and descent, will be founded today in Hotel Hollenden to seek post-war justice for Hungary.

Messages were received by founders of the federation yesterday from several Hungarian organizations in Latin America and Canada asking membership and pledging their co-operation.

The founders of the organization, convinced of an eventual Allied victory over Germany, hope to be able to influence the British and American governments in their treatment of Hungary after the war. According to Dr. Rusztem Vambery, New York criminologist, political errors and injustices committed by the Allies after the World War should not be repeated.

"The ruling coterie which was installed in Hungary after the World War," Dr. Vambery said, "pursued the identical silly policies of the pre-war government. It pinpricked neighboring non-Magyar countries in an attempt to regain land which belonged to pre-war Hungary and so caused bad relations."

Although he said the federation would be opposed to the restoration of the old Hungarian empire, Dr. Vambery asserted it would seek restoration to Hungary of territories where Hungarian residents were predominant.

Dr. Vambery believes that the Hungarian government should be ministered temporarily after the war by "outsiders." In this interim Hungary's "common people" could be schooled in governmental affairs, after which they would be in a position to resume control of their land.

Today's session will be held in the Hollenden at 3:30 p. m. An attendance of more than 50 is expected.
