A Simple Wedding for Magda Gabor

Miss Magda Gabor and Mr. Arthur "Tony" Gallucci will advance their wedding date to Easter Sunday, they confided early yesterday morning at a champagne party given by her mother, Mrs. Jolie Gabor, at her 16 E. 63d St. home.

They will be married in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Leslie Verme in Franklin, N. J., and will leave by plane on Tuesday for Paris.

"We don't want this to be a big publicity thing," said Magda, the eldest of the three Gabor sisters. "Tony and I are so in love—we want a private little intimate family wedding. We are not even telling mother the change of our plans—because she is so big-hearted, she has to invite every one."

Tony held my hand and said, "This is our happiness—and you are only here because you are a long-time friend of Magda. Zsa Zsa and Eva. So forget you are a reporter. Don't you dare ruin our wedding by revealing the date.

45 and Handsome

Tony is a handsome forty-five-year-old contractor who lives at 1 Station Square, Forest Hills. His father, Samuel Gallucci founded the family firm.

"I can give Magda what she deserves—the best," Tony said. "But if it were necessary, she is the kind of a girl who'd do the washing and ironing for me."

Twelve violins played and Donald Maloof, baritone, sang at the party, which also honored Miss Eva Gabor, whose play, "Little Glass Clock" had just opened. Miss Zsa Zsa Gabor came from California for the event.

Their Gowns

Magda wore a cherry and silver lame gown. Jolie wore pale blue satin and chiffon. Eva wore white satin and Zsa Zsa's gown was blue satin incrustated

with jewels. Seventy guests in formal attire were present. Columnist Earl Wilson and I were the only two members of the press on the guest list.

An Associated Press photographer was admitted around 2:30 a. m.

"I met Tony five years ago —," said Magda, showing me her ring of cut diamonds and emeralds. "I fell in love with him, but we had a misunderstanding that lasted for a year and a half. I am so happy. No more career for me ever—except him."

Admires Family

Tony circled his prospective bride's small waist and, drawing her close to him said "I want

to say one important thing. I have the greatest respect and admiration for this family, who had everything in their lives in Hungary and who came to America to start from scratch. I don't know of another mother who has three such beautiful daughters with such intellectual charm."

Zsa Zsa told me that Porfirio Rubirosa will arrive today from Florida to see her. West Coast contractor Hal Hales had flown in from Los Angeles to attend last night's party with her. "Eva is likely to marry Dr. John Williams from California, who also arrived to attend the party and the wedding," Zsa Zsa said, but she did not say whom she is likely to marry.
