.me. Jambor, who is Budapest-born, is a graduate of the Royal Academy of Music in that strife-torn city. In Berlin, the artist studied and gave joint recitals with Edwin Fischer.

A well-known composer and lecturer, she also in later years made extensive tours throughout Europe winning both the Brahms Prize and the Warsaw Philharmonic Grand Prix of the International Chopin Competition. She came to the United States with her husband after World War II, and at present is a faculty member of the Peabody Conservatory of Music.

Mme. Jambor's most recent public performances include appearances with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the National Symphony and the Baltimore Symphony.

Agi Jambor Plays Tonight Over WINX

AGI JAMBOR, Hungarian pianist now living in Washington, begins two series this week, both of which are innovations in local



music. Tonight at 7 Miss Jambor will play the first of 13 halfhour concerts over Station WINX. During these recitals, regular listeners will hear the entire first book of the

MISS JAMBOR Well Tempered Clavichord by Johann Sebastian Bach, the 24 preludes of Chopin, the first book of preludes by Debussy, the Chopin B Minor Sonata and works of Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert, Liszt, Ravel and Gershwin Mark of Halls, 147 Tommorrow evening at 7 o'clock

Tommorrow evening at 7 o'clock American University inaugurates a weekly series of seminars on problems of playing the piano, and piano repertoire, with Miss Jambor as pianist and teacher. Various piano masterpieces will be studied, played in whole or in part, and commented upon by members of the class, the public, which is invited (subject to a nominal fee), and Miss Jambor herself. A similar course for singers, which must unfortunately be held at the same time, is to be taught by Edith Henry of New York City.

Coming to this country in March of this year, Agi Jambor has appeared twice in Washington, twice with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and made her New York Town Hall debut last Thursday. She is scheduled to open the Friday Morning Music Club recitals early in November, and is returning to Europe briefly in January and February for appearances in Scandinavian countries and over the BBC.
