Mrs. Kapus, who speaks excellent English, sat in her wheel chair and related their ordeal in low, almost matter of fact tones.

She said they were within 50 feet of the Austrian border when she stepped on a land mine and her left foot was blown off. Kapus threw Eva. over a barbed-wire fence into Austrian territory and then dragged his wife to safety as a Hungarian border guard opened fire.

"I hope you grow to love this country," said Mr. Eisenhower. "I hope you like Texas because I was born there.'

The Kapuses were brought to this country under the refugee program of the Foreign Operations Administration, in cooperation with the National Catholic Welfare Conference which sponsored the family and paid there passage.
