## Agreement,

Made this 1<sup>st</sup> day of February 1922,  
by and between Julius de Kerekjarto,  
party of the first part, and  
party of the second part.

Witnesseth: In consideration of the sum of  
One Dollar, each to the other paid and the  
covenants, herein contained, it is agreed:

That said party of the first part will furnish  
the artistic services of Duci de Kerekjarto,  
violinist, for a concert in Youngstown, Ohio,  
on Wednesday the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March, 1922.

For and in consideration of the services  
so to be rendered by the artist above  
mentioned, the party of the second part  
agrees to pay on demand on appearance  
of the artist on the stage of . . . . .

not later than . . . P.M. on the date mentioned, the sum  
of Five Hundred and 50% of the net income above One-  
thousand Dollars in New York draft or cash as shall be  
specified in advance by party of the first part.

It is further agreed that the party of the first part  
shall furnish 50 - three sheet-posters, 100 window cards, 1500  
circulars, 4 newspaper cuts, and other necessary advertising  
matter for said concert, without extra charge.

DUCI de KEREKJARTO, born December 27, 1900, has, despite his youth, an extremely interesting and artistically unique past to look back upon. His 100th recital is rapidly drawing near and he easily holds the world record for popularity.

He is known to have attracted capacity audiences, throughout both neutral and war-ridden Europe, even at times when all other artists were obliged to perform before small sized crowds. The published comments of the foremost musical critics form a veritable collection of sublime eulogies of his genius, while the enthusiasm of his audiences almost invariably manifests itself in scenes so stirring as to be unexampled in the biography of any other artist, living or dead.

In many a city he has been carried from the auditorium to his hotel upon the shoulders of his frantic listeners, thus not infrequently blockading the traffic and being compelled, upon reaching the hotel, to give from the balcony of his suite countless encores to the thousands of admirers gathered under his window, while at the railroad stations women used to shower him with flowers and hosts of students—led by members of the faculty—would see him off amid tumultuous cheers and singing.
