Desfroyer Ingraham Launched at Charleston

CHARLESTON, S. C., Feb. 15.— The 1,500-ton destroyer Ingraham, built at a cost of \$5,000,000, was launched today at the Charleston Navy Yard. It will be commissioned this summer.

Dr. Tivor Kerekes, representing the American-Hungarian Federation, presented a bronze plaque to the vessel which was named for Capt. Duncan N. Ingraham (1802-1891), who won thanks of Congress for interfering with the detention of a Hungarian-born American citizen aboard an Austrian warship at Smyrna in 1853. Capt. Ingraham, a native of Charleston, later served in the Confederate Navv.
