To his son. A frank and candid letter in which Tyler expresses his admiration for the Hungarian revolutionists under Kossuth and his horror at their treatment at the hands of the Austrians and Russians. He compares their struggle with "our Revolution".

Writing about America's position, he states that to manifest our displeasure by withdrawing all diplomatic intercourse . . . would not be taking part in struggles of Europe—no stepping out of our sphere of neutrality.

On the European Kings: "King-craft has been playing its last game by descending from the throne and seemingly adopting liberal principles. It discovered of democracy and popular rights with all the flippancy of the demagogue. The people saw that its object was to render the throne more stable . . . and now the great struggle has occurred between liberty and despotism."
