"The conversation then turned  
upon the war just closed. He said  
Kossuth had been paid 3,000,000  
to agitate the revolution in Hungary,  
which was mainly intended to bring  
Austria to speedy terms, and that  
Kossuth was privy to all this and  
had no expectations of effecting  
anything in Hungary. That  
Prince Metternich, just deceased,  
had a letter of Kossuth's

in his possession which  
would settle his character  
with the Republican world  
if published, but that  
the Prince positively refused  
to give it to the public, though  
he had tried hard to  
obtain his consent...."

(1/15/1858 - "1/4/1861)
