in 1849 P. approved the invasion
of Hungary by Russia

one one occasion the cabinet
held a special meeting to forbid
P. to receive K. in his house
but could not prevent
him from openly demonstrating
his sympathies, or from
declaring that a less popular
visitor to England, Gen.
Haynau, "logger of women,
ought to have been" tossed
in a basket.
