Please pardon the long delay in answering your letter. It was not until this evening that I received the enclosed negatives of snapshots one of the Academy boys so kindly took for me free of charge. The views of the inscription are of course duplicate and are on the top of the stone on the right hand wall, Mrs. Long's is on the left.

The views are of the house <sup>are</sup> in its present location which is some 400 feet from where it was when Long lived in it. The house too is much smaller and lacks the barn which used to be at the end of it. It has been at its present location for about 15 years. The picture shows very poorly the house in its old setting. The Exeter News Letter owns the cut and might give you a better print if you write them.

On inquiry I find no one who knows about any papers of Com. Long. All of his immediate connections have died and his affairs have been lost track of entirely. A German

barn burned last summer which was full  
of old things and if there was anything  
of the Long family the some people here thinks  
it might have been there.

I am sorry that I have nothing  
more to offer you.
