G. C. Hebbe to Edmund Burke

Washington July 15. 1852

"— I have had letters from Gen.  
Kossuth — in which he complains  
much of the deception which  
certain persons of the Democr.  
party have made themselves guilty  
of in regard to himself — and I  
have had the utmost difficulty  
in preventing him from taking  
steps which would undoubtedly  
have led to the disorganization and  
defeat of the Democ. party — I hope  
that Gen. Pierce's letter to the  
Democrats of Philadelphia has  
satisfied Gen. Kossuth at least  
to some degree — still I know that  
he expected from Gen. Pierce a still  
more explicit avowal in regard  
to the course of foreign policy which  
this country ought to pursue — but  
I think the General could not say  
more in the present state of  
affairs —
