Dear Mdme. Deak:

I an taking this literty of writing you because I as preparing a book on a pert of American history involving the great Louis Kessuth during the years 1848-60, and it may be that the late distinguished Zoltan Deak acquired certain papers pertaining to Kessuth's relationships with George "invola" Sandars.

Sanders was a prominent political figure of the 1850s. He was warmly sympathetic toward Kossuth and cought to neours and through the Democratic Party in 1852 and 1853. Kossuth wrete Sanders many letters during these years.

Most of these letters were rold at an auction in New York in 1910. They appear to have been purchased by Wr. Charles Peleki. a prominent Hungarian collector. After Wr. Feleki's death some of the letters were acquired by the Hungarian rational archives. The rest have disappeared. It is quite possible that Wr. Deak acquired them, because an article which has been shown me by an Hungarian librarian in this country reports Mr. Deak's finding certain Kossuth papers in a book store several years ago.

The Sanders letters are important to my research because he was the leader of the mevement which aought to give assistance to the Hungarian revolutionists led by Kossuth.
