395. KOSSUTH (Louis—Hungarian Orator and Statesman). Seven Autograph Letters Signed.—"L. Kossuth." Together, 15pp. 4to and 8vo, New York and London, 1852-1858. To George N. Sanders.

FINE COLLECTION of letters by this famous Hungarian patriot. In one letter Kossuth speaks of the war between Austria and Turkey. His communication is a fervent appeal to America for ships and arms, alluding to the Milan Convention in Milan and Lombardy. In another letter he says:—"And your government, will it allow the Black Sea to become a Russian Lake or does it do England's protection?" Another letter speaks of the slavery agitation in the United States.
