Garrison and Hossuth

much common between them

almost the same age (G. 3 years younger)

believed most fanatically
both dedicated life to the cause, nothing
else existed for them, felt themselves
prophets

both was imprisoned in service
of that cause, although G. much longer

both experimental, agitator type,
orator, fighters, doggedly determined,
indefatigable, prodigious workers!

both demanded sudden change
(G. - See Henry, Garrison -
Lundy) estranged from those
seeking gradual development

Difference

H. championed a lost cause
outside of his own country,
each day more aware
of the fact that his aim was
further from realization.

H. died, after a long life, a states-
man, 92 - he was a much greater
man intellectually
son of an old nation, which for
centuries slipped and at that time
was apparently deemed to insignificance.

G. in his own country, surrounded
by a growing army of partisans
championing a cause which
no right thinking man could
gain on, feeling stronger every
day, more confident,
seeing his aim closer to
realization every day - G. saw
the victory, when 66 yrs old,
14 yrs before his death
and of a new, growing, big nation
which in its splendid isolation saw
