hundreds of applications,

and many of them from persons of high rank, and urged in such a manner that it was scarcely possible to refuse them; and though previous to the arrival of Doctor Franklin I had resolved to go no farther, and declared my resolution to all, yet for a long time after not a day past without application to him or me, personally or by letter.
