

Poles Celebrate 'Pulaski Day'

'Poland Not Lost,'

N. Y. Parade Slogan

NEW YORK, Oct. 6 (C.T.S.).
Keynoted on the slogan, "Poland
Is Not Lost," 15,000 Americans of
Polish descent today paraded up
Fifth Avenue in the fourth annual
Pulaski Memorial Day celebration.
The demonstration was dedicated to
celebration of the 161st anniversary
of the death of Brig. Gen. Casimir
Pulaski, Revolutionary War hero, who
gave his life in the young republic's
cause.

In the reviewing stand, Senator
James M. Mead, of Buffalo, Democratic
candidate for re-election to the
Senate, and his rival for the office,
Republican Bruce Barton, of New
York city, smiled and shook hands.

Count Jerzy Potocki, Polish
Ambassador to the United States,
headed the Polish notables present.

Police said half a million
watched the procession during its
march from Fourteenth to Fifty-
fourth Streets. The grand marshal,
who rode in an automobile with an
escort of mounted police, was 83-year-
old Emil S. Brykczynski, Brooklyn
banker, known as the "father of all
Polish veterans in the United States."

A conspicuous unit was that of
200 blue-uniformed veterans of
Gen. Joseph Haller's army, Americans
who fought for Poland in the
First World War.

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
