

Ralph S. Banay, 73, Prison Psychiatrist

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NEW YORK, May 21 (AP) Dr. Ralph S. Banay, 73, former director of psychiatry at Sing Sing prison, died Friday in a New York hospital.

Dr. Banay was a foe of the prison system who did much of his research and writing on crime prevention, treatment of delinquents and most recently drug addiction

The Hungarian-born psychiatrist was psychiatry director at Sing Sing from 1940 to 1943.

Years later, he advocated abolition of prisons, which he called relics of "medieval concepts of crime and punishment" that perpetuate and multiply crime rather than arrest it.

He also held that there was a direct link between juvenile crime and movie and television crime fare. In 1955, he told a Senate Subcommittee investigating the causes of juvenile delinquency headed by the late Estes Kefauver:

"If a prison is called a 'College of Crime,' then viewing of violent TV programs by young, emotionally disturbed children is perhaps a 'School for Delinquency.'"

Dr. Banay's survivors include his widow, Mary; a son Ronald, and three daughters, Suzanne Eve, Mary Clare and Roberta Kelly.
