## BARON BESSENYEY, RETIRED DIPLOMAT

Baron Georges Bakach Bessenyey, a former Hungarian diplomat who came to this country after World War II, died Thursday at Doctors Hospital. He lived at 2 Sutton Place South. His age was 67.

Baron Bessenyey had been a member here of the Executive Committee of the Hungarian National Council and of the Assembly of Captive Buropean Nations. A native of Budapest, he served in World War I in the Imperial and Royal Seventh Cavalry Regiment of the Austro-Hungarian forces.

After the war, Baron Bessenyey entered the diplomatic corps of Hungary and served as that nation's minister to Yugoslavia (1938-41), France (1941-43) and Switzerland.

He held the Hungarian Cross of Merit, First Class, and the Grand Cross of the Maltese Order of Knights, and was a Grand Chevalier of the French Legion of Honor. Surviving are his widow, the

surviving are his widow, the former Countess Margit Sigray; a son, Francis Bessenyey; two daughters, Mrs. Antoine P. de Bavier and Miss Eva Bessenyey, and a grandson.
