Anda Shows Brilliance With Philadelphians

The Philadelphia Orchestra. Eugene Ormandy conductor. Soloist: Geza Anda. piano. In Constitution Hall. Program: Fantasia and Fusue in Geninor. Bach-William R. Smith: Symphony No. 7. Roy Havris: Concerto No. 2 in B flas. Opus 28. Brahma.

A fortnight ago we had Gilels and now we have Anda. They are two foreign pianists with considerable advance reputation, each making his American debut this year.

Gera Anda played the second Brahms concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra last night in Constitution Hall and showed himself to have a remarkaby accurate command of the planowed the plays with ease and more than usual brilliance, and has boyish and engaging stage personality.

His tone at times seemed surprisingly thin and brittle particularly in fast passages, although the beautiful slow movement, in which, slowing legato is essential, came off extremely well. In general there was a certain stiffness and lack of relaxation in Mr. Anda's playing which was somewhat out of place in the vomantic mood of the Brahms.
