Gone With the Windsors

By Iles Brody. (Winston; \$3.50.)

Mr. Brody devotes 320 pages to an ill-tempered, sometimes scurrilous attack on the Duke of Windsor and his wife, the former Wallis Simpson. Among the author's favorite sources of documentation are Broadway columnists and news weeklies. He writes like a gossip columnist, so it is not surprising that he has such a high opinion of the species. He objects to the conduct of the abdicated Edward VIII when he was Prince of Wales and yet feels that he let down the empire when he

stepped out, that he should have repudiated Mrs. Simpson and stayed on the throne. The book is in particular a reply to the Duke's autobiography, "A King's Story," and Mr. Brody assails that appealing story in almost every particular. Mr. Brody was born in Hungary. He has been in the United States, writing, for 17 years, often, the publisher explains, "using a pseudonym for his more outspoken pieces."
