

Irene S. Bodor, 90,

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Hungarian Refugee

Irene S. Bodor, 90, who came to Northern Virginia from Hungary in 1960, died Tuesday at Northern Virginia Doctors Hospital.

Born in Budapest, she had lived for many years in the county of Szaboles, where her husband, the late Sigmund Bodor, was a landowner.

She and her husband lost all that they owned at the outbreak of World War II, and they moved to Budapest, where Mr. Bodor died in 1952.

Mrs. Bodor remained there with her two daughters, Cornelia Gyulahazi and Maria Gyulahazi, and a son, Dr. Paul Bodor, an agriculturist, through the Hungarian uprising against the Communists in 1956.

Dr. Bodor fled Hungary after the revolt and came to Washington. He died here in 1968.

Another son, Andre Bodor, had lived in Northern Virginia since the 1930s. He is a building contractor in Falls Church.

Mrs. Bodor and her two daughters, who had lost their families, came to Falls Church in 1960. She became a naturalized citizen in 1966.

In recent years, Mrs. Bodor and Cornelia Gyulahazi, who works for a Washington travel agency, lived at 913 N. Wayne St., Arlington. Her other daughter

moved to Charleston, W. Va., where she is a librarian.

In addition to her three children, Mrs. Bodor is survived by four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.
