THE most popular salesman in "men's wear" at Garfinckel's is a one-time great favorite in Capital society. Handsome Baron Paul Schell, like so many diplomats who served years in Washington, has returned to the scenes of his happier days.

The dapper Baron, who was attached to the pre-World War II Hungarian Legation, who dazzled the debutantes of his era with his good looks and the glamorous Magyar regalia which he wore on State occasions, was abroad when 1939 brought war to Europe. At war's end when "Kepi" Schell wanted to return to the United States he found that the only way he could get here was as a DP!

Baron Schell married after he left Washington, and now

has three small children. "He knows more people than anybody in the store," one of his colleagues told me. "And I expect he knows more about good clothes and sells more than the rest of us."

**Peter Schell, Ex-Minister  
Of Interior of Hungary, 75**

—Peter Paul Schell, who was Minister of the Interior of Hungary when the Nazis took over in 1943, died at his home here on Sunday. He was 75 years old and lived at 71 Myrtle Avenue.

Baron Schell was a political prisoner of the Germans until he was liberated by the Allies in Italy in 1945. He worked for the American Red Cross and the United Nations refugee organizations in Italy before coming to this country in 1947.

He leaves his wife, the former Countess Charlotte Szirmay; a son, 2 daughters and 15 grandchildren.
