## Tydings Is a Fraud

To demonstrate the fairness of the caption on this editorial, we quote directly the language of the Senate resolution under which the Tydings subcommittee of the Senate committee on foreign relations was formed. This resolution reads:

"Resolved, that the Senate committee on foreign relations, or any duly authorized subcommittee thereof, is authorized and directed to conduct a *full and complete* study or investigation as to whether persons who are disloyal to the United States are, or have been employed by the Department of State."

This resolution was passed, it is true, because of certain charges by Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R) of Wisconsin. But its language makes plain that it was by no

means limited in letter or spirit to dealing solely with matters developed by Sen. McCarthy or by anybody else.

It is as broad and powerful a proposition as the Senate has ever laid down, and directs a comprehensive and wholesale inquiry that obviously should have included the origins of the Hiss conspiracy and numerous other publicly proved Communist operations of record.

But Tydings has not done anything on that order.

He has limited operations merely to an attack upon Sen. McCarthy's declarations.

Thus, the so-called "report" just turned in by Tydings and two other defensive Democrats, Sens. Green of Rhode datand and McMahon of Connecticut, is nothing but the final proof of their fraudulent purpose.

They have very carefully avoided a "full and complete study of investigation as to whether persons who are disloyal to the United States are or have been employed by the Department of State."

Read their alleged "report" itself. The truth leaks through every line. And try though he will, Tydings cannot escape the consequences. He is trapped by his own misconduct and will be haunted by it for as long as he remains in public life.
