A Blue White House Featured

Debut Set for 6-Cent Stamp

The Post Office Department will issue an American flag stamp with an air view of the White House area in the new 6-cent first class denomination Jan. 24.

The unlimited printing of the new stamp will begin Jan. 5, postal officials said. It repeats the theme of the fouryear-old 5-cent stamp it replaces. That stamp shows the White House from the Ellipse while the new one gives a bird'seye-view from the Pennsylvania Avenue side.

On the new stamp, the White House will be detailed in blue and the surrounding trees will be green. The inscription will also be in blue. The flag, of course, will bear the usual colors.

The stamp was designed by Stevan Dohanos of Westport, Conn., a member of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee. He has designed nine stamps, four of them flag stamps, in the past eight years.
