

Food Stamp Design By Stevan Dohanos

The design for the United States Food stamp is the work of Stevan Dohanos, an artist and illustrator with three earlier stamps to his credit.

Mr. Dohanos, who is most widely known for his Saturday Evening Post covers, designed the NATO and 49-Star Flag stamps of 1959 and

the 50-Star Flag stamp of 1950.

Born in Lorain, Ohio, Mr. Dohanos got his art training at the Cleveland School of Art. He makes his home at Westport, Conn., where he is a member of the faculty of the Famous Artists Schools.

His vertical format design in three colors honors both the Food and Agriculture Organization's world-wide Freedom From Hunger campaign and the American Food for Peace program, under which surplus American commodities are distributed overseas. The pictorial portion of the design is simply a single head of wheat, in yellow on a green background, with the wording "Freedom From Hunger" in red beneath the framed portion of the stamp. "Food for Peace" appears in a larger semicircle above the head of wheat.

The 5-cent stamp will be issued here June 4, opening

A Blue White House Featured

Debut Set for 6-Cent Stamp

The Post Office Department will issue an American flag stamp with an air view of the White House area in the new 6-cent first class denomination Jan. 24.

The unlimited printing of the new stamp will begin Jan. 5, postal officials said. It repeats the theme of the four-year-old 5-cent stamp it replaces. That stamp shows the White House from the Ellipse while the new one gives a bird's-eye-view from the Pennsylvania Avenue side.

On the new stamp, the White House will be detailed in blue and the surrounding trees will be green. The inscription will also be in blue. The flag, of course, will bear the usual colors.

The stamp was designed by Stevan Dohanos of Westport, Conn., a member of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee. He has designed nine stamps, four of them flag stamps, in the past eight years.
