After a brief stay in Britain, Miss Davas arrived in New York and found herself in the company of similarly displaced actors, such as Oscar Homolka, Fritz Kortner and Walter Slezak, who sent her to an English tutor so she could set out on yet another career on the

American stage.

Her first appearance was in Ferdinand Bruckner's "The Criminals" in 1941, followed by "Soldier's Wife," which ran for almost a year.

Many of her roles portrayed characters fitting her European background and gaining her approving reviews from Brooks Atkinson, Arthur Gelb, Howard Taubman and other New York Times reviewers.

Miss Darvas also played the grandmother in 'Ellilan Hell-man's "My Mother, My Father and Me," Mme. St. Pein in the 1958 revival of Ahouilh's "The Waltz of the Toreadors," and the folio of a French mother whose son was betrayed and killed in World War Two in the play "The-Hidden River," by Butth and Augustus Goetz.

Miss Darvas left no immediate survivors.
