Never Saw Bormann, Argentinian Declares

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BUENOS AIRES, The man who gained worldwide mann early one recent morning. fame recently as the dogged "Sure, he's dead. He died in "Argentine intelligence officer" Berlin back in 1945, so far as who had tracked down Martin I'm concerned. But who can Bormann, the world's most wanted Nazi war criminal, says that he has never seen Bormann, never, in fact. even looked for him and has no knowledge of whether he is dead or alive.

Juan José Velasco, who was identified as the star informant in the newspaper version of Martin Bormann's fate researched by Ladislas Farago early this month, said this week in a series of interviews in Buenos Aires that the documents used by Mr. Farago were forgeries.

A week-long investigation also disclosed that the man whose pictures had been published around the world for the last two weeks, identified as Bormann, is alive and well Argentina. His name is Rodolfo Nicolas Siri and he is a 54-yearold high school teacher, not a 72-year-old Nazi on the run.

These two men-Mr. Velasco and Mr. Siri-are the key to the latest and most sensational of many journalistic versions of what happened to Hitler's deputy at the end of World War II.

In the articles, Mr. Farago calls his informant José Juan Velasco, but there is no doubt that the man whose picture was published with the Bormann articles in The Daily Express of London and The New York Daily News are of Juan José Velasco.

Mr. Velasco, who tinted glasses, described himself as a former intelligence agent. He is 36 years old and carries a valid Argentine identity card in that name.
