Boros Named Golf Pro of Year After Dramatic Rise to Top

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.-The dramatic rise of Julius Boros from obscurity to fame and fortune in one season today earned him professional golf's highest award.

The 32-year-old Hungarianborn swinger was selected "professional golfer of the year" by the Professional Golfers' Associa-

He received an overwhelming 314 votes in a poll of PGA members and sportswriters. Runnerup Sam Snead got only 26 votes.

Boros has been a professional only three years. He never won a major golf tournament, professional or amateur, until he captured the National Open title at Dallas, Tex., last June. He parlayed this championship with a number of other purses and emerged golf's leading money winner with a total of more than
